Parenthetical Citations – "In-text" Citations

- They are called "in –text" citations because they are within the text of your writing.
- In-text citations serve as a guide to the Works Cited page at the end of the project.
- Normally an in-text citation would use the author's last name and specific page numbers.

Two ways to use an in-text citation

Directly quote the author within the text:

Posner argues, "Any rational man would realize Oswald alone murdered President Kennedy" (15).

PUNCTUATION ORDER IS " ().

Use parentheses directly after the quote or paraphrase:

"Any rational man would realize Oswald alone murdered President Kennedy" (Posner 15).

In-text Parenthetical Sentence Starters

According to Posner...

Reading from Posner...

Posner stated...

Posner wrote...

What if there is more than one author?

If there are two or three, list the names in parentheses:

(Jones and Posner 15) or (Jones, Smith and Posner 15)

What if there is no author?

Substitute the author's last name with the title of the document, publication, or website/publisher (Web):

National Geographic claims, "The ocean around Antarctica should be considered the world's fifth ocean (23).

"The ocean around Antarctica should be considered the world's fifth ocean (National Geographic 23).

General Rules:

For citations within the text...

- place your citation as close to the quoted or paraphrased material as possible without disrupting the sentence.
- the parentheses should come immediately after the quoted or paraphrased material.
